FOIA 22-21439-F requested any video recordings that show President Obama signing the Food Safety Modernization Act on January 4, 2011.

This FOIA primarily contains video footage shot by the White House videographer of the signing.

System of Arrangement

The materials in FOIA 22-21439-F are a systematic body of documents responsive to the topic of the FOIA.

Researchers should consult an archivist about related materials. Records responsive to this FOIA were found in these collection areas – White House Communications Agency.

White House Communications Agency records are processed at the folder/videotape level. While this method maintains folder/videotape integrity, it frequently results in the incidental processing of videotapes that are not wholly responsive to the subject area.
