RE: Weekly Economic Recovery Success Stories Report

Job creation, transportation safety, and smart-grid technology were significant themes in this week's Recovery Act stories.

Airports in Virginia and North Carolina received ARRA funds for runway repairs and upgrades. Secretary LaHood announced that Georgia will receive \$7.8 million for transportation infrastructure improvements, primarily on Atlanta's railway system. Amtrak unveiled the first of 81 passenger cars to be rehabilitated in its ARRA-funded improvement program. (Amtrak has hired more than 400 employees at various locations to work on this project.) *Public or Private Co.*

This week also saw the Department of Energy release eight ARRA-funded grants to institutions that will further smart-grid demonstration projects in Massachusetts, Colorado, Hawaii, California, Nevada, Illinois and New York.

In addition, there were additional reports this week of ARRA grants enabling law enforcement agencies to make new hires.

➤ **The Raleigh-Durham International Airport Allocated FAA Recovery Act Funds To Rehabilitate Runway Lighting.** "That Raleigh-Durham International Airport will receive \$1.38 million under the recently enacted American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 (ARRA), U.S. Transportation Secretary LaHood said Tuesday. 'The Recovery Act was put in place quickly to rescue the economy from the worst recession since the Great Depression and rebuild it for a stronger future,' said Secretary LaHood. 'Through the Recovery Act, we are creating jobs in Raleigh and Durham and across the country while investing in the long-term safety and economic vitality of our airports.' The Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) will provide \$1.38 million to the Raleigh Durham Airport Authority for the Raleigh-Durham International Airport to rehabilitate runway lighting on runways 5L/23R. The FAA is moving swiftly to work with airport sponsors to ensure that eligible projects have completed or nearly completed, design and planning requirements. Under the ARRA, the FAA received \$1.1 billion to provide discretionary grants to qualified airports. That

funding has been allocated based on a project priority system that addresses airport safety and security, infrastructure, runway safety, increased capacity, and mitigation of environmental impacts." [Press Release – Dept. of Transportation, 7/21/09]

- **Stimulus Funds Will Allow The Franklin Municipal-John Beverly Rose Airport To Undertake Its First Runway Repairs Since The 1980s.** "Franklin Municipal-John Beverly Rose Airport's aging runway is being rehabilitated at no cost to the city. 'It was to a point where it was needed,' said Jimmy Gray, the airport's manager. He said that the runway hadn't been rehabilitated since the early 1980s. 'It was already in our Capital Improvement Plan, but since we got the stimulus money, the city doesn't have to pay.' The \$2.2 million project, which started on May 18, is being done solely with federal funds from the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009. 'It's a 110-day project,' Gray said. 'So far, we're ahead of schedule.'" [Tidewater News, 7/22/09]
- **Secretary Of Transportation LaHood Announced That Georgia Would Receive ARRA Resources For Public Transit, Predominantly For Atlanta Rail.** "Georgia will receive \$7.8 million in federal stimulus money for transit improvements, mostly for Atlanta's rail system. Transportation Secretary Ray LaHood said Friday that MARTA will get \$7.4 million for upgrade and replacement of the fire protection system for rail stations, lines, and facilities. Funding will also be used to support engineering, design of the models for each facility, and initial implementation. Henry County is to receive \$427,674 for two 30-foot, 16-passenger, wheelchair-equipped buses and one 15-passenger van. Funds will also be used to update communications equipment, software, security radios and cameras, and for preventive maintenance. The money is part of \$3.5 billion in Recovery Act funds for transit improvements nationwide." [Associated Press, 7/18/09]
- **Amtrak Announced The Creation Of Over 350 Jobs Due To ARRA Funds; 60 Cars Will Be Rehabilitated.** "Today, Amtrak unveiled the first of 81 passenger rail cars to be removed from storage, restored to good condition, and returned to service as part of a program to add seating capacity to trains across its national system using funds provided by the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA), said Amtrak President and CEO Joseph Boardman. 'The real story today is about people — the Amtrak passengers who will ride in these rehabilitated cars and the workers who are doing a great job bringing them back to life,' Boardman said, noting that the additional seating capacity on its trains will help connect families, further business relationships, and position Amtrak for expected future growth in ridership. The first car completed under this program is one of 60 Amfleet passenger rail cars to be rehabilitated at the Amtrak maintenance facility in Bear, Del., using \$58.5 million in ARRA funds. Funding from ARRA also is supporting similar work at the Amtrak

maintenance facility in Beech Grove, Ind., including \$19.3 million to restore and return to service 20 Superliner cars and one Viewliner car, plus \$13 million for 15 P-40 locomotives. To perform all of this work, Amtrak has hired 55 employees at the Delaware facility and 108 at the Indiana location. In addition, Amtrak has added more than 200 other jobs to work on numerous other ARRA funded projects across its system."

➤ **Congressman Abercrombie Announced University of Hawaii's Receipt Of Stimulus Allocation For Hawaii Natural Energy Institute For Smart Grid Work.** "The Hawaii Natural Energy Institute at the University of Hawaii will receive one of eight national grants to help demonstrate and promote the use of smart grid technology. Smart grids refer to electrical grids that allow for the more efficient delivery of electric power through the use of computers and other technology to manage electrical loads. They try to avoid huge peaks in power usage and allow electrical power generated from solar, wind and other renewable sources into a system. Hawaii Rep. Neil Abercrombie said Monday that the institute will receive \$5 million from the U.S. Department of Energy. The eight grants are funded through the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act, the economic stimulus legislation passed by Congress in February."

➤ **A Recovery Act Grant Will Allow The Parkersburg Police Department To Hire Two New Police Officers.** "The Parkersburg Police Department received a grant that is allowing them to put two more police officers on the force. The grant is the Recovery Act Justice Assistance Grant from West Virginia Division of Criminal Justice Services. The grant pays the salary of two berts said applying for grants and getting them are so important to the community and the department. 'This in turn gets their salaries paid for. The department will actually now have those two funded positions that have been unfunded for a while.'" [WTAP-TV, 7/23/09]

➤ **ARRA Funds Will Pay for New Hire in Sheriff's Department And Equipment To Alleviate DNA Processing Backlog.** "A backlog of DNA samples at the Sheriff's Office that could help solve crimes will finally get looked at due to extra help being hired, paid for with federal stimulus funds. A \$108,000 grant will help pay for an additional person at the San Mateo crime lab to run tests on some of the 80 cases that need DNA, or forensic biology — any bodily fluid recovered at a crime scene — examined, according to Jim Granucci, the lab's director. The order of the cases depends on the urgency and trial date. Examining evidence takes time — much longer than the amount shown on TV shows such as CBS's 'CSI,' Granucci said. 'You can't do DNA analysis in 40 minutes,' he said with a laugh. The entire lab is staffed with 33 people, seven of which work specifically with DNA, Granucci said." 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**ORAL Statement of
Dr. John P. Holdren
before the Committee on Agriculture
United States Senate
Washington, D. C.
July 22, 2009**

Chairman Harkin, Ranking Member Chambliss, members of the Committee: I very much appreciate the opportunity to testify at this important hearing. My written statement for the record and my brief oral one here focus on the scientific aspects of the relation between global climate change, on the one hand, and agriculture and forestry, on the other.

That relation is a multifaceted one. Farming and forestry practices are significant sources of the emissions that are driving global climate change, as well as points of particular vulnerability where climate change imperils human well-being by reducing the productivity of the land. With appropriate management, on the other hand, farms and forests can become the locus of increased carbon storage that draws down the atmospheric load of CO₂, as well as serving as sources of renewable, low-carbon biofuels.

Although it's the case today that climate change has benefitted farms and forests in some places while harming them in others, and this mixed pattern may persist for some years more, there can be little doubt that the larger temperature increases expected by 2030 and beyond on a "business as usual" trajectory of global climate change would put substantial stresses on farms and forests in most places. Such stresses can be alleviated to some extent by adaptation efforts of a variety of kinds, of course, including development of heat-, drought, and pest-resistant crop strains and more efficient water-management schemes for agriculture. We absolutely need to make well focused and effective investments in such measures.

But adaptation becomes more difficult, more costly, and less effective the larger are the changes in climate to which one is trying to adapt. The need to restrain climate change to a level with which affordable adaptation measures can plausibly cope is what has led so many analysts of this problem to conclude that every effort should be made to avoid exceeding a global average temperature increase of 3.6 degrees F (2°C) above the pre-industrial level. Looking at the numbers on what will be required to achieve that goal makes clear that the agriculture and forest sectors simply must be part of the program: we will need the reductions in emissions that can be had by reducing tropical deforestation and by modifying the agricultural practices that currently account for significant methane and nitrous emissions; we'll need the increases in absorption of carbon dioxide that can be had from afforestation and reforestation and improved management of agricultural soils; and we'll need the contributions that expansion of sustainably produced biofuels can make to reducing our dependence on CO₂-emitting coal, oil, and natural gas.

All of these opportunities are sufficiently well understood scientifically to support implementation of policies and activities to help us get from the farm and forest sectors the contributions needed from them if the challenge is to be met. At the same time, continuing to improve our scientific understanding of the relevant processes, including our capacity to measure

and monitor them quantitatively on local to regional scales, will be valuable for increasing confidence that the performance specified in policy and international agreements is indeed being achieved, for developing improved understanding of some of the currently less well researched options in the agricultural and forest sectors for both mitigation and adaptation, and for refining our policies in the decades ahead.

Achieving the high confidence that decision-makers and the public will want concerning offsets and the reality of emissions reductions or uptake increases claimed for other initiatives in the agriculture and forestry sectors will rely in substantial part on existing tools such as the EPA's National Greenhouse Gas Inventory, land-use data, carbon-cycle modeling, and the project-based monitoring approaches that have been developed by EPA and USDA. Our current observation networks for emissions and absorption of CO₂ and other heat-trapping gases are not adequate for some of the kinds of monitoring that would be desirable, however, and a continuing effort to strengthen the network of ground-based, air-based, ocean-based, and space-based measurements of these fluxes is warranted.

The many approaches for deriving clean fuels from plant material differ in state of technological development, efficiency of energy conversion, requirements for land and water and other inputs such as fertilizers and pesticides, cost, net benefit in reducing greenhouse-gas emissions when all inputs as well as influences on soil and vegetation where the material is grown and elsewhere are taken into account, and other environmental and social impacts (positive as well as negative). While much is known about these factors, the technologies are evolving and so is our understanding of their full range of characteristics. I believe we know enough to define appropriate metrics to help with choosing options and with regulation, but we will get better at it as our scientific understanding of the details improves.

Continuing to strengthen the scientific foundation for policies and strategies in this domain going forward will bring significant rewards in terms of our confidence in the performance of the approaches that are put in place, the ability to improve those approaches over time, and the capacity to develop additional options for farm- and forest-based climate-change mitigation and adaptation for the future. OSTP is energetically engaged -- together with the full range of relevant cabinet departments, other federal agencies, and White House offices, and with our partners in the wider research community and the Congress -- in ensuring that this happens. My colleagues in the White House and I look forward to working with this Committee and the rest of the Congress to this end.

Thank you for your attention. I will be pleased to try to answer your questions.
